They are the size of a DLE envelope.

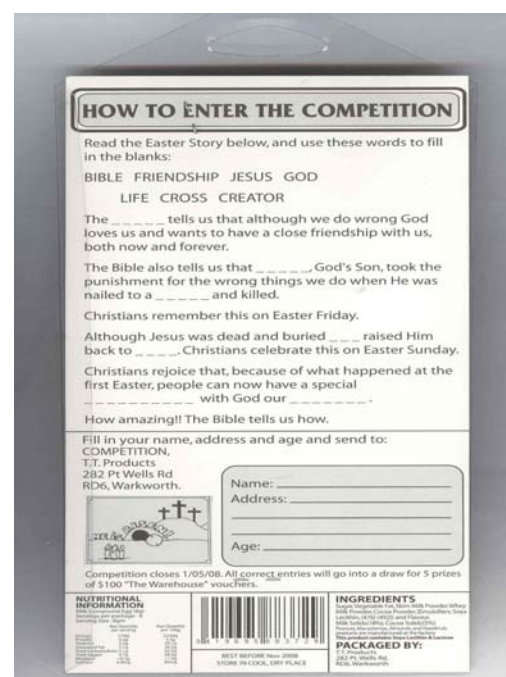
They have also been given away for students at Bible in Schools, and also 250 were given away as a free gift at the local shopping centre.

What wrap around support is provided?

- We take the hustle and bustle out of employment

- Each individual is assigned a key worker to walk alongside them
- The key worker’s role is to make sure the employee is on time, respectful and is working to the satisfaction of the employer
- The Employment Action Co-ordinator will work with both the employer and the employee to resolve any issues that may arise
- Regular phone, email or personal contact will be made with the employer and employee
- In agreement with the employer and employee, site/work visits will be made
- Professional practice in social work, counselling and whanau work is available for people working through issues that create barriers to employment

- People in the community trying to get ahead and make positive changes in their lives
- People who have found it difficult to get into sustainable employment because of barriers they have encountered

What we will not support?

- Any behaviour that puts the employer/employee and staff at risk.

Ordination and Installation of David Rice as the New Bishop of Waiapu



Cathedral bells pealed over Napier on Saturday, heralding the Ordination and Installation of David Rice as the new Bishop of Waiapu – the fifteenth Bishop in the Diocese’s 150 year history. David Rice is pictured here with some of the clergy from the Waiapu Diocese.

More than 800 people flowed into the Waiapu Cathedral for the Ordination Service, including the three Archbishops of the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia, 16 other Bishops and about 80 clergy. There was a 40-strong contingent from Dunedin too, including Peter Chin, the Mayor, and Dr Tony Fitchett, a GP who is a leading Anglican layman, and who preached the Ordination Sermon.

David Rice was the Dean of Dunedin’s St Paul’s Cathedral for the last seven years, and that Dunedin contingent came to escort Bishop Rice and his family to Waiapu.

The service was rich and colourful, with karanga, waiata, and an affirmation of faith in Te Reo Maori. Waiapu has a rich history where the bringing of the Christian Gospel to this country is concerned hymns, prayers, readings, vows and the sermon in English, as well as small contributions in Fijian, Samoan, Tongan, Hindustani and Latin. And for good measure, Bishop Rice, who was born and raised in the United States, and who has Irish and Native American ancestry, also offered a traditional Cherokee prayer.

At two and a half hours, the service was also lengthy. But as far as the Rev Erice Fairbrother of Flaxmere was concerned, that time didn’t drag a bit. “There was a great liturgical flow” she said. Proof of that, she says, came from her six and a half year old granddaughter who was at her side throughout.

No fuss, no bother. No asking to be taken outside – content to watch and absorb.

But according to Bishop Api Qilio, from the Diocese of Polynesia, one of the most significant aspects of David Rice’s Ordination wasn’t referred to at any point in the service. That’s his age. At 47, David Rice is a young Bishop – and he has said himself that his election is evidence of a growing desire within the church to see the next generation of leaders begin to emerge. “For me” said Bishop Qilio “David represents the future. I looked out over the congregation today and I saw many grey heads. But he is an embodiment of the church renewing itself.”

No doubt some of the congregation were keen to just eyeball the new Bishop. But Erice Fairbrother felt that for many, there was more at stake: they genuinely wanted, she sensed, to reach out and extend a welcome to their new Bishop and his family.

That was a sentiment that was shared by one of the three former Bishops of Waiapu in Saturday’s congregation. Sir Paul Reeves – the first Maori Bishop elected in a Pakeha Diocese – was Bishop of Waiapu from 1971 to 1979. “Waiapu” he said “is a very warm, embracing and welcoming Diocese – and that was shown today. I hope the new Bishop will be encouraged by that.” David Rice preached his first sermon as Bishop in the Waiapu Cathedral the next day, Sunday morning – and it will be his last for a couple of months. The Rice family is leaving for the United States this week, and Bishop Rice will fly from there to England where he will attend the Lambeth Conference of Bishops. He will be back in Waiapu with his family in September.

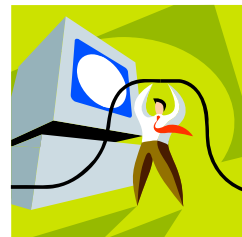

Countdown to the Lambeth Conference 2008 Canterbury, England, 16th July – 4th August,

What's it about?

We can't underestimate the importance of The Lambeth Conference. To be held in Canterbury, England, from the 16th July – 4th August, this gathering of bishops from our worldwide communion has a range of aims.

As we prayerfully support them let us be aware that they are aiming to:

- Be restored and refreshed spiritually and gain deeper knowledge of each other;
- become more aware of the spiritual and physical resources God has given them to meet missionary challenges in different parts of the world;
- develop greater understanding and appreciation of life together in the Anglican Communion;
- address conflict and discover a new level of trust in common service to God;
- gain greater understanding of the contribution Anglicanism can make to the worldwide Church and the world.

The bishops will spend time together in spiritual reflection and prayer, learning, sharing experiences, and discerning their particular role in God's mission for the world. As they do so, they will cover a wide range of subjects. These include the study

- Biblical interpretation / Hermeneutics
- Ecumenical Management
- Anglican identity and the role of bishops
- Issues of Covenant
- Listening Process (within the Communion)
- Engagement with other faiths
- Evangelism and Mission
- Gender and Sexuality
- Relationships, Social and family relationships
- HIV/Aids
- Millennium Development Goals



A desire to stay together

The first Lambeth Conference took place in 1867 – partly, as it happens, in response to a crisis about the limits of diversity allowed in the Anglican Churches around the world.

So there is nothing new about a Lambeth Conference meeting in a climate of some controversy. Archbishop Rowan Williams has commented: ‘that first gathering was a moment when there was a real acknowledgement that a worldwide Church had to find ways of sharing its challenges and its triumphs – and some aspects of its decision-making.

In spite of the painful controversies which have clouded the life of the Communion for the last few years, there remains, as many people have repeatedly said, a very strong loyalty to each other and a desire to stay together.’ At last count about 75% of bishops worldwide had formally registered for the Conference; with a number of others signalling that they will attend. This certainly shows a desire to stay together.

Being present in spirit

We are asked to pray – sharing in the Lambeth Prayer:

*Pour down upon us, God, the gifts of your Holy Spirit,
that those who prepare for the Lambeth Conference
may be filled with wisdom and understanding.*

*May they know at work within them
that creative energy and vision which belong to our humanity,
made in your image and redeemed by your love,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen*



A set of seven Bible studies entitled ‘Signs on the Way’ has been prepared.

Focusing on St John’s Gospel, these studies complement those in which the bishops and their spouses will take part during the Conference. It is hoped that Anglicans worldwide will use this series as a way of being present in spirit at the Lambeth Conference, supporting their bishops before, during and after this important gathering. Palliative Care Massage Tuition - Peggy Dawson

A training to provide massage tuition for those who wish to work with people suffering life threatening illnesses, the elderly, and those with physical and mental disabilities. **Peggy Dawson** has been teaching in this field for 15 years. She was trained in the San Francisco School of Massage and worked in the "Coming Home" Hospice, Mother Teresa's Home for people living with AIDS, and the Pacific Presbyterian Hospital. Peggy teaches each year in Italy, Australia and New Zealand. She is an International Trainer of Infant Massage, and has worked in an Orphanage in China with 220 babies and children. She is deeply committed to the integration of massage therapy, Healing Touch Ministries and Spiritual Direction.

2009 RESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Governance Board of Vaughan Park Anglican Retreat Centre is inviting applications for the 2009 Vaughan Park Residential Scholarship.

The scholarship will provide the successful applicant with a supportive environment, including accommodation and meals, for a period of three consecutive month's full time study at the Centre.

Applicants may be lay or ordained, will hold a recognised level of tertiary education, be committed to an approved subject of study and able to be a resident at Vaughan Park for the period of the Scholarship.

Applications will be made in writing to the Scholarship Grants Committee of the Vaughan Park Governance Board and will include: a short biography, an abstract and overall context of the study and be supported by at least two and no more than three references.
